Sue O'Sullivan Federal Ombudsman for Victims of Crime	 An update on proposal to develop coordinated victim response to mass victimization/terrorism, embedded in incident command structure through the creation of specialized victim response staff Update on the development of an International Framework for Dialogue and Information Sharing - Meeting the needs of Victims of Terrorism Recent terrorist attacks in Europe, the USA and around the world have had a devastating impact on the victims. Governments and support organisations alike are struggling to provide an effective response which ensures that the specific needs of victims of terrorism are met immediately after an attack and in medium and longer term. Recently, key practitioners from many victim serving organizations have been informally/formally connecting and sharing expertise lessons learned, research, initiatives and good practices. - Responses will be measured by the way victims and families are treated; the earlier that victim services bodies can become engaged, the more positive outcomes result
- Responders are strongly encouraged to engage in the preparedness/planning stages for victims/witnesses & families, with a short/medium/long-term perspective:
 - Strategy development, research & operationalizing planning, sharing best practices, storing lessons learned
 - FBI & UK Family Liaison Model provide benchmarks of victims specialists
 - Frameworks are available to responders to leverage existing victims resources
- Further discussion of responders themselves as victims (PTS Injuries), cultural changes required for 1st Responders to admit to the impacts of trauma

Public Safety Canada & SOREM Updates:

- PSC voicing its support of efforts advancing a mass victimization response model, as presented by Fed Ombudsman Sue O'Sullivan
- PSC focusing upon national issues with a holistic lens, enabling and facilitating broader discussions. Response will always comprise an important component of EM, but rising costs of response must shift the focus onto mitigation first
- Emergency Management (EM) Context Changing Disaster Trends and Risk Landscape flooding remains most frequent and costly disaster type in Canada
- SOREM acknowledges the importance of CTSEMC in this engagement and as part of the dialogue.
- New government = new ministerial mandate & direction based upon inclusivity, consultation, and whole of society broadened scope
 - o Coordinated national action plan to address PTSI in public safety
 - Restoration of HUSAR funding
 - o Comprehensive action plan for all levels predict & prepare for natural disasters
- Recent Meetings of FPT Deputy Ministers and Ministers:
 - o New model necessary for disaster response and recovery
 - Modernize the EM Framework (new EM Plan)
 - Federal government urged to bolster funding in mitigation efforts, Canadian Wild Land Fire Strategy, firefighting infrastructure investments, etc.
- Disaster Risk Reduction The Sendai Framework (ultimate mitigation)
 - Goal: Substantive reduction of disaster risk and impacts on peoples, businesses, communities and countries
 - Outcome: Prevent new and reduce existing disaster risk, and thus strengthen resilience.
 - o The Seventh Annual National Roundtable for DRR will be held on November 21-22, 2016

- in Montréal, Québec. This year's theme, "Understanding the Risks", is taken from the first of four Priorities for Action under the Sendai Framework for DRR.
- Canada will be hosting the 5th United Nations Regional Platform for DRR in the Americas in Spring 2017.
- 1000 participants from 55 countries and territories in the Americas, and from regional and global organizations active in DRR.
- National Disaster Mitigation Program expanding from flood focused only
- Public Safety Broadband Network:
 - At the May 6 meeting of F/P/T Ministers responsible for emergency management, a commitment was made to accelerate engagement on the development of a PSBN.
 - Several PSBN related projects and pilots are ongoing at different locations across Canada, including: Calgary Police Service Pilot in partnership with Motorola Solutions/Ericsson; Simon Fraser University pilot in British Columbia; PSBN test bed at the University of Regina in Saskatchewan; and
 - Research underway at the federally-operated Communications Interoperability Research, Test and Evaluation Centre.
 - The Montreal Model was never approved by the Minister. A shared network allowing for cost-sharing between all public safety users and commercial providers, may best meet PSBN objectives for guaranteed services levels in a cost effective manner

- Training & data 'core' to all of the recommendations received during public comment period, gaps in capacity and recognition of necessity for WPA have been acknowledged



•Search and Rescue & Heavy Urban Search and Rescue

PSC is leading a review of a National SAR Program for Canada including:

- o a renewed governance and policy framework; and
- o potential options to align light, medium and heavy urban search and rescue
- research still underway, determination of governance will precede the coordination & funding
 - ❖ Broad stakeholder consultation taking place to inform the SAR review and on updated National SAR Program, including Provincial and Territorial governments, municipalities, Tri -Services; volunteer sector, etc.
 - Consultations with SAR stakeholder groups and committees to occur over the coming months. Consultation will also be taking place on October 12-16, 2016 - SARscene – Edmonton, AB.
 - Stakeholders will be provided with a discussion paper on Search and Rescue and asked to provide feedback to the PS.

- This committee, in its mandate broadly, is not unique and therefore I believe we should work hard to find that "niche" for this group that will add value to the triservice communities in Canada but also be mindful of you have to eat an elephant one bite at a time.
- In that regard is there an appetite to review the mandate to ensure that it is reflective of the intention and requirements / expectations of the committee membership but also the three core services?

Group Observations:

- There are linkages and shared issues pertinent to other bodies. There is strength in a unified voice amongst all three Associations but the 'silo' factor amongst the three organizations still exists. Using the Safety Sector Network meetings as an example, the resulting information sharing becomes stalled.
- Encourage consistency amongst the Associations, to undertake more strategic
 positioning, and formalize governance (including a meeting schedule) amongst them.
 Current challenge seems to not be enough direction from the presidents and ED's,
 resulting in inconsistent messaging and an appearance of being fractured at the
 federal level.

Demonstrating the effectiveness of CTSEMC?

- Acknowledging logistical and financial challenges, meeting frequency should be increased, one annual gathering is insufficient
- Clarification of purpose required: to advise and inform the Association presidents (based upon evidence)? Or has authority been delegated to speak on behalf of the (CACP) Chiefs?



- Advocate to have the annual CTSEMC meeting rotate among the tri-services AGM's
- It is acknowledged that the opportunity exists to influence the strategic discussion at the F/P/T tables
- Challenges in maintaining relevance, if lacking a "one thing" as a committee to champion:
 - Comprehending the gaps and shared issues amongst the tri-services, acknowledging the differences in legislative requirements amongst the three, example: national mutual aid
 - A draft questionnaire about mutual aid requirements will be forthcoming to the CTSEMC membership via Dave McCormack)
 - Presentations with a purpose: What to do with the information? Should there be focus upon developing recommendations to the presidents? resulting from meeting presentations:
 - Mutual Aid
 - Victims' Response
 - NG -911
 - o Framing future meetings around national themes?
 - Command and decision making centres
 - Etc.?
 - Could there be an opportunity to collectively host a conference amongst this membership?
 - The CCEMO membership meets on a monthly basis, every second meeting features an exercise component, (particularly amongst Atlantic provinces and states partners)



 Revisiting the mandate and terms of reference, re-evaluate the relationship with CITIG, PSC Safety Sector and other related tri-services committee's? Conference Board of Canada offers a number of webinars available free of charge: The future of wild land fires Volunteers Active Shooters 	
 DRR roundtable and CRH-net symposium will be hosted this year in Montreal, November 21-25th.
